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A Message From... Rabbi David Sofian

With the approach of fall, all of us turn our thoughts to that extraordinary period of time which we usually call the High Holidays, what the tradition knows as *Aseret Y'mai Teshuvah* (the Ten Days of Repentance). Of course, this is particularly true for rabbis. If you promise not to tell anyone, I'll tell you that rabbis don't always turn to this subject with calm spirits.

The holidays bring not just the beginning of the Hebrew year, but also the beginning of the synagogue program year and all that it entails. In synagogue life there is always a huge amount of work to get done in those quickly diminishing days before we gather to hear the sound of the shofar. And this is in addition to the significant efforts that go into preparing for the Holiday services themselves. In the midst of this furious activity I like to remind myself that these coming days are not something to be endured but a time that holds the promise of profound meaning. How so?

There is something special about this time of year which draws us back to our Jewish roots. There is something

about the sacred drama contained in these holidays which touches us personally. Somehow we are able to put aside our questions and doubts and know that we are truly standing before God as we all rise before the open ark to sing and hear the *Avinu Malkeinu*. There is the realization afresh when we listen to and recite the *Unitanah Tokef* prayer that indeed we cannot direct everything about our lives.

We know that God is a shepherd seeking out the flock and numbering and considering each and every one of our souls. We know that even though so much of our lives is set and decreed we still each have the ability to influence the course our lives take with our prayers, our repentance and our acts of righteousness.

Somehow at this time of year we come to realize again that our deeds do not pass away unrecorded, that the life choices we make do stand in judgment over our hopes for the future. Somehow we know that we can be forgiven for the past and renewed for the future if we only sincerely repent.

As every year, I am looking forward to sharing this profound experience with you. As every year, let me wish each and every one of you a healthy and fulfilling New Year.

I've always been a sucker for new beginnings. When I was younger I loved thinking up New Year's resolutions. (I'm not sure how many I actually kept!) When I began to learn about Judaism, I was delighted to find an opportunity at Rosh Hashanah to reflect on the past year and then look forward into the future.

Here at Temple Israel, we have some significant new beginnings this year. I'm thrilled at the new relationship we began in August with Temple Sholom in Springfield. Their students will attend our religious school two Sundays a month and their teachers will work with our teachers. Our rabbis will conduct a monthly service in Springfield. And we will welcome members of Temple Sholom to Temple Israel for services and programs throughout the year. I'm excited to meet the dedicated

members who have kept their small congregation going.

After more than a year of work, Temple Israel will be involved in the birth of a new organization, **Lift Greater Dayton**, an interdenominational group that will advocate for jobs, education, and youth in the region. If all goes according to plan, the organization will launch its efforts here at Temple Israel in October and could help create a fresh start for the greater Dayton region.

Nothing says "new beginning" quite like a new garden. Make sure to check out the garden at the south end of our building. Feed Dayton's Ken Carmen put in many hours this summer planting vegetables which will go to the hungry in our community. And Temple Israel's own Ellen Faust is coordinating Temple volunteers to help with garden maintenance and overflow.

Reaching beyond our community, we will identify a progressive congregation, somewhere in the world, to whom we will donate a "spare" Torah. It is a blessing and a mitzvah to give them a new beginning: the gift of Torah.

Enrich Your Yom Kippur Afternoon

After morning services end on Yom Kippur, remain at Temple for afternoon discussions that will be thought-provoking, inspiring and interactive. Services will resume at 3:00 p.m.

Rabbi David Sofian, recently back from a summer in Israel, will show portions of the documentary *Faces Of Israel: A Discussion of Marriage, State and Religion In The Jewish Homeland*. He will also discuss the significance of the Rotem Conversion bill in Israel, a piece of legislation that would delegitimize all non-Orthodox conversions and would also preclude conferring citizenship under the Law of Return to Jews who did not qualify not qualify for such status on a prior visit (i.e. converts). The bill is currently under a six-month freeze.

Rabbinic Intern Aaron Miller will focus on *Kedoshim Tihyu*: What it really means to be holy. He'll take a look at Jewish stories throughout the centuries that help us define what it means to life a sacred and holy life.

Sh'liach Tzibbur Alan Halpern will take a long walk and invites anyone interested to join him.

At the end of this month we will reset the Torah to its beginning, *Bereshit*, marking the commencement of a new cycle of Torah reading. Every year we set out to read the *parshiot* (Torah portions) through different lenses—to better understand the nuances of the text and see how new experiences enable us to approach the Torah from new perspectives. This year, I would like to offer us all a chance to understand the Torah through the voices of women.

Over the last several decades, women have added their voices to our understanding of Judaism in the forms of leadership, scholarship and prayer. Their contributions have helped us examine our tradition from a contemporary feminine perspective. I would like to offer a casual learning environment for us to explore some of this material.
